B.A. LLB. (Hons.) – The course is taught by lecture method, seminar methods and tutorials. The Lecture is supported with Power Point presentations. Case study method is also followed in teaching for practical subjects.

LL.M. :- LL.M. Programme is basically based on research part, therefore, this course is taught through lecture and discussion method, that Promotes the students to participate in teaching learning process as an active participant. The assignments are allotted to students. The Students can develop their research skills in using case study method and dissertation on research topic.

M. Phil :- The advance teaching and research methods are opted to teach scholars. The lectures, discussion, seminar and case studies and dissertation on research topic are used.

The departmental committee monitors the learning outcomes of the programmes. Time to time internal examinations is conducted to evaluate the knowledge of the students. Competitions are organized within the department (Moot Court competitions, Debates, Law Quiz's). Professional skill and personality traits for students are also motivated to participate in various activities organized by different national law universities and other institutions in India and abroad. After completion of the course students from school of law have been placed in various institutions such as (government & non government, administrative and judicial) around 12 students have qualified NET examination, 2 students are serving as IAS officers, 02 students are serving as Judge Advocate General, 14 are serving as Civil judge, 06 students are serving as ADPO, 02 are serving as District Legal Aid Office remaining have adopted advocacy as their profession. After Completion of LL.M. and M. Phil 50% of students are serving as Faculty of Law in various educational institution around 10% students are serving in corporate sector, 5% students have undergone Legal Research (enrolled for Ph.D.) and remaining have adopted advocacy as their profession .
